
Evolution in action.

IF WE'VE LEARNED ANYTHING from our beloved wild residents over the past 125 years, it's that evolution isn't always comfortable—but it is always essential. With this in mind, Denver Zoo welcomed growth in a multitude of ways in 2021, with milestones of celebration (125 Years of Love), embarkation (implementing our Strategic Plan) and even organization, as we restructured our Conservation and Education departments to better align with our mission.

We continued to enhance both animal welfare and guest experience with three significant new offerings, including an industry-leading animal hospital and authentic new habitats for our African penguins and Linne's two-toed sloths. And, with the approval of the RISE Denver GO Bond, we began to chart a course for critical ADA improvements to our pathways and lighting.

We did all this while enchanting more than 1 million guests during a year of worldwide recovery, and while refocusing our energies on the central passion of everyone in this organization: a duty to protect wildlife and wild places. Here's where our ongoing evolution took us in 2021.





Conservation Connection

Since 1996, Denver Zoo has participated in more than 600 conservation projects in 62 countries spanning six continents—including efforts to protect iconic Colorado species and their habitats.

Denver Zoo worked with multiple partners to lay the groundwork for reparative donations of 14 American bison to Native American tribes' conservation herds across the West.

Denver Zoo spread gallons of mountain lion urine along trailhead parking lot perimeters, resulting in a 90% reduction in mountain goats wandering into these high-traffic areas.

Oohs and aahs aside—every one of our beautiful Zoo babies is part of a worldwide conservation partnership with our AZA colleagues. As the planet's wild places disappear, zoo-based breeding efforts like the Species Survival Plan (SSP) represent many species' best chance for survival.


